### WHAT IS COMMUNITY ORGANIZING?

- A method for building power, particularly in communities that have been excluded from decision making.
- Organizers work to build up leaders, create and advocate for solutions, and change systems. Organizers also build relationships and engage with and advocate for their communities.

#### WHAT IMPACT DO NATIVE WOMEN HAVE?

- Seventh Generation Thinking: Native women lead with a focus on the generations now and those yet to come.
- Reclaiming Roles + Systems: Native women organizing challenges patriarchal structures imposed by colonization and creates pathways for more inclusive governance and leadership.

#### WHAT IMPACT DO NATIVE WOMEN HAVE?

- Building Power: Native women excel in building strong networks of mutual aid, solidarity, and support.
- Collective and Inclusive Decision-Making:
   Native women emphasize holistic decision making processes, centering the voices of the most impacted and ensuring all perspectives are heard.

#### WHAT IMPACT DO NATIVE WOMEN HAVE?

- Strategic Vision: Drawing from their lived experiences Native women organizers navigate systemic barriers while creating innovative solutions to challenges like systemic inequities, lack of resources, and threats to sovereignty.
- Making Space for Future Leaders: Native women leaders often actively mentor and empower others, particularly youth, other women, and two spirit relatives, to step into leadership roles.
